THE EPIPHANY OF THE LORD JANUARY 8, 2012

First (Hebrew) Scripture: Isaiah 60:1-6

The splendor of the Holy City of Jerusalem is proclaimed. It is a beacon of light in the darkness.

The New Testament Letter: Ephesians 3:2-3, 5-6

The salvation of God is given to Gentiles as well as Jews. The Gentiles are the limbs of the body of Israel.

The Gospel of the Epiphany: Matthew 2:1-12

The visit of the Magi from the east sparks a troubled mind in Herod and his followers. The newborn king is not in the halls of power but in a house with his mother. The Magi visit, pay homage to the child, and present gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh, before returning home guided by a dream from God.

Breaking Open God's Word:

The light has come into the darkness of the world. Yes, the glory of God shines. The star filled with a special light leads the Magi to Christ. They give him gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. He is the one. He is the light of the world, the source of light, the Christ.

Reflections on the Readings:

As a society, during these days we can be in something of a "postpartum" depression. Our celebrations of Christmas and the New Year are over, and after today many of us will put away the decorations and the last visible remnants of the celebrations of the past weeks. The apostle Paul today uses the expression "partners in the promise." This is an uplifting phrase for us to reflect upon, and to think of as our own calling in these days following the birth of the Lord. What is this promise? We can find it in the gifts the magi bring: it is a promise of being a royal priesthood (gold), a holy nation (frankincense), a people set apart for self-giving (myrrh). We find more of the promise in Isaiah—a light shines upon us! In the psalm we know a promise of a world of flowering justice, profound peace, the poor rescued, pity for the lowly and the poor. This is the promise; and one of the best ways for us to lift ourselves out of any possible low spirits we may be suffering is to live out our partnership in this promise each and every day.

WHAT WILL THE NEIGHBORS THINK?

It must have been quite a sight on the streets of Bethlehem as the magi, those star-searchers, made their way to the house of Joseph (in Matthew's Gospel the holy family are residents of Bethlehem until the flight to Egypt). Imagine the wonder that filled the eyes of the neighborhood children as this caravan made its way. Matthew doesn't tell us many specifics about them (he never numbers them as three or calls them "kings"), but travel was hard in that time, and "safety in numbers" was the rule for making a lengthy trek. Most likely it was a lengthy cortege that wound its way under the guidance of that star. If the celestial phenomenon that guided them there hadn't already excited the village, the arrival of these women and men (in the ancient world astrologers and sign-readers were frequently female) with their dromedaries, unusual clothing, foreign ways—and gifts!—certainly would have roused the neighbors. News travels fast in small towns, and imagine the surprise when it was learned where these travelers stopped.

DON'T BE FOOLED

We can include the magi on our list of role models in faith for the season. They were not Jews, but were willing to follow a route that led to an insignificant and troublesome Roman province. When they were led to the holy family's humble abode in Bethlehem they did not say, "No way! This can't be the place. It's too lowly, they're not affluent enough." They simply bowed down and worshipped Jesus the Christ, in a scene that prefigures the disciples bowing to worship him later in Matthew's Gospel after his resurrection. These sign-seekers were willing to be led by their wonder, ready to persist in their journey, not knowing where the quest for their revelation would lead them, but open to its possible presence anywhere. We, like they, must be ready to seek the *epiphania*, the manifestation of God, earnestly and honestly, and be prepared to bow in worship when we find it.

MESSAGE FROM FR. GEORGE

"Brothers and sisters:

You have heard of the stewardship of God's grace that was given to me for your benefit, namely, that the mystery was made known to me by revelation. At all times, I will ask one thing from all of you: communication. Our work together can only be successful if we have a full and open channel of communication. We cannot make fully informed decisions without full information. So I will expect you to come to me and talk to me. Together we can solve any problem.

As your Priest charged with the duties of a pastor, I am responsible for providing you with sacramental opportunities and spiritual growth. I am hopeful that during my short tenure we can continue to grow as a faith community.

Finally, as your Brother I will do all these things with an abundance of humanity and humility. Like all of you I will stumble and fall, and like all of you I will need prayers and support. I know that you have always been a gracious and loving community and I am hopeful that you will accept me as a friend and brother.

I promise that I will support you and I would ask, cognizant of my humanity, that you give me your prayerful support as we go about our work of bringing the hope, joy, and peace of Christ's Resurrection to all. I look forward to our journey in faith together.

DEACON SPEAKIN'



In today's gospel, we once again hear the story of the three wise men from the East (sometimes referred to as the three kings) coming to find the Messiah, the Christ child, Jesus. This gospel story tells us, along with the second reading, that Jesus came for all people, including

us Gentiles (non-Jews), and not just for the Jews. Jesus is the Jewish Messiah, but He is also our Messiah. As Paul states, the Gentiles are co-heirs with the Jews for all that God promised, and all that God gives us through His gift of Jesus Christ. How great is this!!!

The beauty and the wonder of the gospel is the fact that its message is as current and applicable to our personal lives as the latest newsbreak. Today, we ought to think of ourselves as one of the three wise men. And as the saying goes, "Wise men still seek Him" and we need to do that. When we look at the Christmas story, we see the shepherds come to the stable, see. worship and adore Jesus, and then go back to their lives with this new mission to tell the world, their own world for sure, about their meeting Jesus and what it meant to them. The magi also searched for Jesus, found Him, worshipped and adored Him, and then went back to their lives "by another way," a way that was different from where they came. They too were changed and surely were now on a mission to tell the world, their world, about the Jesus they met, and what it meant to them. Notice how none of these visitors stayed with Jesus. They met Him. Their lives were changed for having met Him. They were sent out into the world to spread the good news. We are to do the same. This Christmas, once again, we searched for Him through Advent. We met Him at the stable on Christmas. Now we must go back to our lives, changed for having met Him. Now we must start a new year telling the world, our world, what this Christmas season we just celebrated with the world has meant to us. How it has changed us. How it can change the world.

Pray for me as I will pray for you, that we go back to our ordinary lives "by another way."


With the new year, we began a new prayer list. If you would like the name of a loved one on the list, please call Donna or Pam at 630-627-4526. They will remain on for eight weeks. After that time, family should let us know if they want them to remain on the list.

BLESS YOUR DOOR ON EPIPHANY

The Gospel tells us that the magi found Christ "on entering the house." The door to your home is a holy threshold. You can bless those who come in and go out by inscribing above the door in chalk the first two numbers of the year+C+M+B+the last two numbers of the year. Tradition tells us that the letters stand for the name of the Magi: Caspar, Melchior, and Balthasar. Adolph Adam points out that it may also mean "Christus Mansionem benedicat" or "May Christ bless this dwelling." It's appropriate to bless your door in January—janua means "door" and the first month is the door to the new year.

After inscribing the doorway, say this prayer:

God of Bethlehem and Cana. God of Jordan's leaping waters, in baptism you bring us into your family. You wed us and embrace us as your beloved. May we fill this place with kindness to one another, with hospitality to guests, and with abundant care for every stranger. By the gentle light of a star, guide home all who seek you on paths of faith, hope and love. Then we will join the angels in proclaiming your praise: Glory in heaven and peace on earth, Now and forever. Amen.



FROM THE ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS COMMITTEE



Can cigarette butts be harmful to the environment?

Littering is not only an eyesore but it also is against the law and subject to a costly fine. In addition, used cigarette filters can take up to a year to break down in fresh water and up to five years to break down in seawater. On dry land, the process can take even longer. Discarded cigarette filters often contain lead and cadmium in addition to nicotine, and tar. These chemicals can leach into lakes, streams, and rivers. In laboratory experiments a transparent crustacean that transfers energy and organic matter from algae died after only 48 hours of exposure in concentrations equivalent to only two used cigarette filters per liter of water.

It is easy to be a steward with regard to trash, and this includes cigarette butts. Please help!

Reduce – Reuse – Recycle and please don't litter.




